Minutes General Sessions

EFC-MAYM Ministry Team Leader Gathering Friends University, Casado Campus Center President's Dining Room Friday, July 23, 2021, 5:30 p.m.

David Williams welcomed the gathering to this meal which is offered as a thank you for service to the yearly meeting. Stacey Wheeler led in singing the Doxology to close the time together.

Opening Session Redeeming the Time – Whole Church Friends University, Sebits Auditorium Friday, July 23, 2021, 7:30 p.m.

The session opened with the reading of the Dream Document by a diverse group of Friends, followed by a corporate reading of the Lord's Prayer.

David Williams welcomed attendees and thanked Friends University for extending their hospitality to EFC-MAYM. Dr. Amy Carey greeted the conference, gave a brief update on the school, and asked for prayer for Friends University in the days ahead. She then prayed for the conference and attendees.

Worship music was led by Abby Penna with help from Kaleo Academy and Barclay College students.

David Williams led in recognizing the work and service of David and Carol Kingrey who are concluding more than 16 years of leadership with the Church Leadership Institute for Ministry. A gift of flowers and a certificate of appreciation was given. David Williams prayed a prayer of thanks for the life and Christian service of David and Carol Kingrey.

Jesse Penna prayed a prayer of blessing for the evening's offering and prayed for the session speaker, Brockie Follette.

Four Kaleo Academy students assisted Brockie Follette by answering the questions of what their dream for the Friends Church would be, and if they feel there is a place for them in the church. Brockie spoke about the need for the church to be a safe and welcoming place for youth and young people to ask questions about the issues that they are dealing with in life. She asserted that the three most loving words adults in the church can say when confronted with youth's difficult questions are "Tell me more..."

Morning Session Redeeming the Time – Whole Gospel Friends University, Sebits Auditorium Saturday, July 24, 2021, 9:00 a.m.

Thayne Thompson opened the morning session with announcements and prayer.

The Home Missions Board welcomed representatives from St. Paul Friends Church. They will be recommended later today to the representative body for full church status. David Williams prayed for this group.

Thayne Thompson emphasized the vision of Home Missions and highlighted the importance of local church planting in North America. Carrie Corliss, chair of the Home Missions Board, noted that videos produced by that board will be sent to churches in the yearly meeting for use in the local church. She prayed for the morning's offering and introduced the speaker for this session.

Jim Le Shana, general superintendent of Northwest Yearly Meeting, spoke to the conference from Oregon. He addressed the importance of cultivating a missional multiplication movement, referencing the early believers in the book of Acts using new ways to reach new people. He emphasized why church planting is important today:

It is in our DNA - it's who we are.

There are some people we will never reach unless we start new churches.

The most effective method of evangelization today is to start new churches.

The Holy Spirit seems to be moving in the hearts of those among us around the country.

He also stressed what hinders us from church planting:

Fear of failure.
Fear of success.
Scarcity thinking. (What if we don't have enough ?)

He reminded the conference that God is sufficient and able. He closed his remarks with prayer.

Thayne Thompson opened the evening session and introduced Stan Leach, the new Executive Director of Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM). Stan Leach spoke via Skype to extend his greetings to the conference and express some of his vision and enthusiasm for his new position with EFM. He concluded his remarks with prayer for the congregation.

Brad Carpenter, with Sarai and Gideon, and Brad's parents Bruce and Donnetta Carpenter joined Thayne, David Williams, and Dan Cammack of EFM onstage. Brad and Chelsea Carpenter and family are preparing to return to the mission field in Rwanda in coming days. Dan Cammack prayed a prayer of recommissioning for them as they return and adapt to life in Africa again.

Mike and Susan Neifert led in music worship.

David Williams prayed for the evening offering and speaker. The Ministry Conference offerings are in support of the \$150,000 goal in honor of EFC-MAYM's 150-year history. Thirds of the goal amount will go to church revitalization (Whole Church), church planting (Whole Gospel), and global missions (Whole World).

Rusty Savage, board chair for EFM, spoke about the ways EFM is taking the gospel to the whole world. He declared that our greatest commitments are the result of our greatest passions. The three passions that fuel EFM's commitment to global missions are:

The passion for obedience. (Matt. 28: 18-20) The passion for the lost. (Matt. 9: 36-38) The passion for the glory of God. (Ps. 96: 1-8)

Closing Session Community Worship Celebration Friends University, Alumni Auditorium Sunday, July 25, 2021, 10:30 a.m.

Presiding Clerk Diana Hoover opened the worship celebration with prayer. Stacey Wheeler led in music worship with the help of others from several areas of the yearly meeting.

Following a Home Missions Board video, Tony Wheeler prayed for the morning offering.

David Williams presided over the Recording Ceremony with the assistance of Thayne Thompson and Diana Hoover. Recording candidates came to the stage and responded to the questions of why they serve in ministry and why they do so in the Friends Church. The following persons were recorded: Todd Follette and Brockie Follette – prayed for by their recording coach, Keith White. J. C. James, accompanied by Penny, his wife, - prayed for by Thayne Thompson.

David Williams spoke on the conference key scripture of Habakkuk 3:2 "I am amazed, Lord, at the powerful things you did in the past. Now I pray that you will do great things in our time."

He shared with the congregation the word he received from the Lord while on sabbatical: "There's a storm coming. Make sure my people are prepared." He urged us all to read the book of Revelation throughout this year and challenged us with the counsel of Revelation 2 and 3:

Remember! Repent! Return! Reward!

LEADERSHIP TEAM REPORTS Lead Superintendent David Williams

"It is the judgment of this meeting that Kansas Yearly Meeting be opened, at the time and place proposed, in the year 1872, provided the consent of the Yearly Meetings with which we correspond be obtained thereto."

- Indiana Yearly Meeting Minutes, 1871

By the grace of God, consent was indeed obtained, and the very first session of Kansas Yearly Meeting was held in Lawrence on October 11, 1872.

What a scene it must have been. According to a reporter from the *Western Home Journal*, "The throng on Massachusetts Street on Friday morning, as 10 o'clock, the time set for assembling at the Meeting House approached, seemed larger than the crowd seen at Topeka any day during the State Fair."

For several days Quakers from around the country had been arriving by ox wagon, buggy, train and on foot. An estimated crowd of 3,000 Friends gathered for Sunday services, representing every yearly meeting in America. They gathered in a newly constructed meeting house made of native limestone, a "magnificent" structure built on an elevated site at the eastern edge of Lawrence. The men met on the first floor and the women on the second, with messengers chosen to convey information from one meeting to the other. There were overflow services for those outside the building who could not get in.

Based on the accounts provided by Sheldon Jackson in *A Short History of Kansas Yearly Meeting of Friends*, the agenda for this very first gathering of what is now known as Evangelical Friends Church-Mid America Yearly Meeting was strikingly similar to what we currently experience at our annual Ministry Conference. Guests were welcomed, speakers were heard, reports were presented, prayers were offered, officers and committees were appointed, and a book of discipline was approved.

And yet it was anything but "business as usual" during that inaugural yearly meeting in Lawrence. As noted in the October 18, 1872, edition of the *Lawrence Tribune*: "The presence in this city of two thousand or more of these good and worthy people was an event which will long be remembered by our citizens ... in everything they did they seemed to be under the influence of the Holy Spirit ... all the proceedings of a business nature were sandwiched as it were with many fervent prayers and earnest exhortations ... our reporter is truly thankful that the Friends captured and held Lawrence for a week."

As the first great yearly meeting of Friends in Kansas came to an end, newly appointed clerk William Nicholson closed the gathering with the following minute:

"In conclusion of this, our first Annual Assembly, we humbly but joyfully acknowledge that our Heavenly Father has been pleased to answer the desires of our hearts, in enabling us to transact the business that has come before us, with a regard for His will, and in love and condescension one to another; and in dispensing largely of spiritual blessings to many of us. To Him be glory through Christ Jesus. The Meeting now solemnly concludes to meet at the appointed time and place next year, if the Lord wills."

For nearly 150 years now, the Lord has graciously willed that Friends from across Mid America continue to "meet at the appointed time and place." Over time, our community has grown to encompass Friends not only from Kansas, but Missouri, Oklahoma, Texas, Colorado, Nebraska and Minnesota. As we enter into our sesquicentennial year as an extended family of Friends in Mid America, it's time to celebrate!

Here is a sneak preview of coming events:

July 2021:

Inauguration of year-long sesquicentennial celebration during 150th yearly meeting of Mid America Friends at 2021 Ministry Conference in Wichita, current headquarters for EFC-MAYM

Updated, sesquicentennial version of *EFC-MAYM Faith & Practice*, presented for prayerful consideration at 2021 Ministry Conference in Wichita

Conference theme and general sessions focused on reaffirmation of our historic, core mission as Mid America Friends: "to equip the WHOLE CHURCH to take the WHOLE GOSPEL to the WHOLE WORLD in Jesus' name."

Initiation of \$150,000 sesquicentennial fundraising initiative:

\$50K for WHOLE CHURCH (congregational renewal) projects in "Jerusalem," including completion of Lawrence meeting house renovations

\$50K for WHOLE GOSPEL (home mission) projects in "Judea and Samaria," including the planting of at least one new church among unreached people in Mid America

\$50K for WHOLE WORLD (foreign mission) projects at "the ends of the earth," including the establishment of at least one new field among an unreached people group in cooperation with Evangelical Friends Mission

July 2022:

- Conclusion of year-long sesquicentennial celebration during 151st yearly meeting of Mid America Friends at 2022 Ministry Conference in Lawrence, original headquarters for EFC-MAYM
- Updated, sesquicentennial version of *EFC-MAYM Faith & Practice*, presented for final approved at 2022 Ministry Conference in Lawrence
- Completion of \$150,000 sesquicentennial fundraising initiative, including dedication of renovated meeting house in Lawrence and commissioning of new home and foreign missionaries

More details will be revealed during our 2021 Ministry Conference, which will be held July 23-25 on the campus of Friends University in Wichita. Make plans now to participate in this very special sesquicentennial celebration. It won't come around for another 150 years!

Executive Superintendent Thayne Thompson

2020 was the year none of us will ever forget. Life, as we know it, on this earth changed dramatically, and will likely never be quite the same. But, God did not change. As the world shut down leading into Ministry Conference 2020, I recall the feelings of fear and uncertainty that crept into our lives and culture. From the outset of COVID-19 none of us knew what to expect, nor where this would all end up. But, as time passed, we were caused to recognize that we were not in control. Fortunately, however, God still was, and is.

When I look back over the past year ministry activities, also, were not normal. There were no international trips, and very few trips out of state. All of us learned how to connect for worship and ministry online through Zoom and other social media platforms. As I reflect back on the past 12 months I am grateful for the many ways God continued to do what He does best...bring good out of all types of circumstances (Ro. 8:28). We are blessed!

Let me recount a few of those blessings:

In a year of social distancing, most of us learned how to connect online. A number of our churches gained an online presence that they never had before. From a Yearly Meeting level, EFC-MA became a lot "smaller", as we learned how to conduct all of our boards virtually, so no matter where a person resides, they do not have to expend the time and expense to travel to Wichita in order to serve with others across Mid-America. Recently I was online through phone with one of our boards, while other members joined from Wichita, eastern Kansas, north central Kansas, Oklahoma City and south Texas. None of us were prohibited from participating due to location. We have established a new paradigm.

Financial support across EFC-MA remained strong. As we entered the pandemic, many of us anticipated an immediate negative financial impact in our churches and our Yearly Meeting. However, in a number of our churches giving was actually up during 2020, when compared to the previous year. And, we were blessed to experience the same at the Yearly Meeting level. At the end of the year, this provided us with the opportunity to invest in ministries where needs have arisen.

Church Planting in EFC-MA didn't skip a beat! During 2020 we welcomed Living Friends in Ft. Worth, TX into full church status, while launching a new church in Texas City, TX and taking initial steps towards launching a new work in the Kansas City area (Raymore, MO).

EFM had its strongest year in history with record giving and implementing a 5 year goal of launching 5 new mission fields with 10 new missionary families by the year 2025. Around the globe our ministry partners remained strong and resolute to continue to spread the gospel in spite of the ongoing pandemic. They, too, recognize God is still in control.

Finally, I am hearing of many ways our ministry as EFC-MA actually grew during the past year. Churches, like Glen Elder, Argonia, Iglesia Amigos OKC (as well as others I am unaware of) actually added people to their churches during the pandemic! Rupak Tamang, our ministry leader in Bhutan, tells me that COVID-19 has provided an open door for the gospel due to the fear and uncertainty people have faced. Like the Apostle Paul, Rupak has been requested to come to various parts of the country and share the "good news" with families who want to know Jesus for themselves. Isn't that amazing!

I'm sure these are not all of the blessings of the past year, but only a few. When circumstances take a turn for the worse, God often does His best work. I am grateful for what God has done for us, for my family, and for me, during the past year. In spite of all of the uncertainty associated with the past year, God remains faithful.

Moving forward, I sense much hope as we "regather" and embark on our 150th anniversary as a Yearly Meeting. Unlike the cloud which hung over us during the past year, the upcoming year seems ripe with hope and potential. Like the rainbow after the storm, we look forward to the upcoming season of ministry with much anticipation. Thanks for your partnership as we do our best to reach people Jesus died for locally and around the globe.

While Kristina's job description will be a bit flexible and experimental especially through the end of the year as she works 5-10 hours a week, her main job can be described as follows: Assist and support Director of Student Ministries with the Coordination and organization, administration and promotion of EFC-MAYM student ministries (Summer Camp, Roundtable, Wilderness Retreat, Bible Quiz, Spring Invasion, Saltshaker, Regeneration, Summit, etc.)

I have several reasons I am excited about this opportunity but wanted to say I am thrilled to have someone who lives and works in the south Texas area join our EFC-MAYM team in a formal way in our student ministries and beyond. Join me in "officially and formally" welcoming Kristina to the EFC-MAYM team.

As I consider God's provision and timing in providing workers for the harvest field, Camp Quaker Haven has been a pivotal place for student ministries for a long time that God has used to call many, many workers into the harvest field; too many to count as you consider all of the students and adults who have attended a camp at CQH since 1949. When we did the extreme camp makeover in 2009, there was a moment near the end of that 6-month makeover, where there were several older folks who were still at camp working day and night to finish up the projects before the first summer camp group arrived. I recall talking to a group of students who were summer camp staff that year, begging and pleading them to jump in and help us finish the work. I recall being moved to tears as I asked and wondered, who will take over for these elderly persons who are volunteering their full time help when they are no longer able to serve in this way? That question is more prevalent today than ever. Will you join me in praying that God would raise up workers for his harvest field known as Camp Quaker Haven? Who will God send to take the place of those workers who have gone before us?

As I type this report, I am getting ready to head down to camp. As you are reading this report, camp will have already concluded. I am praying God will use this summer's camp to raise up more workers for his harvest field. I look forward to sharing in person about camp while we are together at ministry conference.

A few items in "looking back" over the last year:

Youth pastor's round table – 14 representatives gathered in Haviland, Kansas for Round Table from Friday November 13th– Monday November 16th 2020. These representatives that gathered: Josiah Brown from Friendswood Friends, Gabe and Sarah Hancock from Rose Hill Friends, Michael and Mallorie Scott from Haviland Friends, Aubrey VandenHoek from Derby Friends, Brockie Follette from Kaleo Academy/Barclay College, Parker Titus from Northridge Friends, Chase and Kristina Davenport from Friends Community, Katie Daniels from Miami Friends, Jodi Kinniburgh from Northridge Friends and Jesse and Abby Penna from EFC-MAYM all comprise the Student Ministries Division. We also participated in the annual Youth Ministry workshop co-sponsored by Barclay College and Youth Core Ministries with our special guest Steve Argue on Saturday, November 14th which included a day of teaching and discussion with Steve on the topic of creating spiritual depth in young people.

<u>Junior high bible quiz</u> – We ended up having the whole 2021 season online by using a buzz in live website and zoom for the quizzes. While this was not ideal, it did allow for a full season of quizzing. To date, this past season was one of our biggest seasons with 20 teams. The last Virtual Quiz Finals were held on Saturday, April 24.

Thank You for creating this position out of your great love and care for our leaders.

Director of Multiplication Ministries Randy Littlefield

Church multiplication certainly matters because the church is the bride of Christ, but also the church is God's intended vehicle to advance the gospel and grow believers into the image of Jesus. New churches matter because they are the most effective of all churches in reaching the lost around us. New church planting is no longer on the fringes of church life. Here in Mid-America Evangelical Friends Church, our new church planters are some of our best heroes because of their investment in extending the Kingdom of Christ. MCM Associates are privileged to help our churches to build the infrastructure of support for our new church plants. The church year of 2020-2021 has been especially difficult during the months of the international covid pandemic, but our new church leaders are blessed and determined survivors! Over and over they communicate how faithful and merciful our God has been in their new ministries.

So just like in many of our established churches, our planters report that their people have been faithful in their financial giving and prayers for one another and their dedicated pastors.

Two new projects have begun this year: Come And See Friends Church in Texas City, TX with Walter and Wanda Lawson, and Raymore Missouri Friends Church with Shane and Adele Brown. Five other projects continue through development: Oasis Friends in Dodge City, KS under the pastoral leadership of Jay and Gloria Morford; Friends of Topeka, KS with Jesse and Savannah Waller; Iglesia Amigos OKC with Isai and Sucely Ramos; Adonai Friends in Hurst, TX with Elisee and Mariam Mutshipayi; and Iglesia Amigos North Houston, TX with Arnoldo and Delmy Garcia Costillo. Several of these projects are on track to be recommended for maturity during the next year.

Due to the numerous obstacles of this church year, two of our new church planting projects have been closed this church year. Our African Friends Church project in Abilene, Texas under the leadership of Pastor Ekwenya and Veronika Mitaci was closed late last summer when the family moved to Cincinnati, OH. The Mitaci family has now begun a new Friends Church under our Eastern Region Friends leadership. We have reports that that new church is growing and moving toward health. The Sudanese project, All Nation Friends Church, in Omaha, NE was also officially closed this year. Also most recently our Amigos work in San Antonio TX may need to close due to the physical health issues of their Pastor Runy Moscoso. Please pray for Pastor Runy, and with Home Missions leadership for this ministry.

Other new church planting projects here in EFC-MAYM have progressed through the various phases of their new church development cycle that we call their Journey Toward Maturity, which includes seven phases from initial conception to health and maturity. When a new plant reaches that growth phase, their particular Partner Church Advisory Team, that has given guidance from the very beginning, then proposes a recommendation to your Home Missions Board for that new church to be considered for Full-Church status. That recommendation is then forwarded to the EFC-MAYM Elders and on to the church representatives at the annual Ministry Conference.

MCM Associates continue to identify and empower Regional Multiplication Catalysts from our other evangelically-minded regional Friends offices, and to share resources and best practices with these leaders. MCM Associates also co-hosted our first very successful International Friends Church Multiplication Conference, virtually, in November 2020, with special guest speaker Dr. Ed Stetzer, from the Billy Graham Center in Wheaton IL. Participants included leaders from Friends Churches from all around the world who interacted and saw a mighty movement of the Holy Spirit during this time.

Multiplication Catalyst Ministries is a not-for-profit board of Friends church

leaders from across America and is partially funded from EFC-MAYM Home Missions, but also relies on financial support from individuals and churches who recognize our movement's need for on-going multiplication of disciples and churches. BOARD AND MINISTRY TEAM REPORTS

ELDERS BOARD Diana Hoover, Clerk

When Dennis McDowell asked me to serve on the elders board of our yearly meeting, I didn't hesitate before saying yes. However, after I told my husband, Rex that I was asked to serve, he wasn't so enthusiastic. I called Dennis back and said that I had better think about it before I made the commitment. He basically said, it was too late, he had already told the board I would serve. So, here we are, about 7 years later and I am finishing up my service to this body of believers. I originally was just finishing out a term for an "at large" elder who had resigned and then I was appointed to two full terms. HOME MISSION BOARD Carrie Corliss, Chairperson

As the new chairperson of the Home Missions Board, it's an incredible privilege to have a front row seat at all that God is doing among EFC-MAYM's home missionaries in our own home mission fields! The Home Missions Board has the great responsibility and privilege of overseeing, equipping, encouraging and supporting church planters and church planting projects across mid-America. Did you know that there are currently 9 church planting projects in development across Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, and even St. Paul, MN? Several of these projects are nearing full church status, a couple are very early in their development, and several others are mid-way through the development process. Each of these projects is reaching new people that were not being reached by an established Friends Church. The project in St. Paul, MN as well as the AFGC extension church in Liverpool, TX have both been recommended by the Home Mission Board for full church status at this year's Yearly Meeting session.

Home Missions Board members are working diligently to fulfill the responsibilities at hand. Randy Littlefield (my amazing dad) has served EFC-MAYM for decades, and most recently as Director of Multiplication Ministries for EFC-MAYM, Home Missions Board Chair (until 12/31/20), and Director of Multiplication Catalyst Ministries. While he wears many hats, his passion is seen in on-the-ground work directly supporting church planters. Thayne Thompson serves the HMB as Executive Superintendent. He is also serving as coach for Shane Brown, planter of our Raymore, MO project, and as chair of our Church

Planting Conversations Team. David Byrne also serves EFC-MAYM in many roles, and as Texas Area HMB representative, including an executive board role and chair of our new Leadership & Discipleship Training team. He also serves as Board Chair for Multiplication Catalyst Ministries, Executive Director for Coalition for Hispanic Ministries, and he provides critical support to our Spanish-speaking projects. MISSION MOBILIZER TEAM Mike Neifert, Chairperson

The Missions Mobilizer Team (MMT) continues to support the ministry of Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM), our missionary-sending agency.

We are thankful for the willingness of members of EFC-MAYM's churches to serve on Field Support Teams (FST) for the mission fields assigned to us. The Central Africa FST has seven members from EFC-MAYM. The other teams we are seeking to field are for Bangladesh and Bhutan.

The Blessing Fund established a number of years ago to help with the educational needs of EFM workers. The fund as all market investments seem to have done during the past year's crisis, took a dip, but monies are still available to provide all that is necessary to fulfill the fund's purpose without continued outside investment. This past year, we helped one of workers in Rwanda with an accounting class relevant to her duties.

This 2020 "Run for Missions" was a success. The 100-mile trek from Haviland to Wichita was broken into segments and done as a relay. Each runner representing one of the Yearly Meeting's Areas was tasked with raising at least \$1,000. The goal was to meet or exceed \$10,000 in total donations. I am happy to report that we met our modest goal and then some. Funds from this year's efforts went to help meet income goals for D.K. and Choity Sarkar and Samson and Priscilla Retnaraj. Planning for the 2021 relay which will take place on November 6, 2021, is well underway. Our funds will be targeted at Ireland's underfunded workers.

In April, members of the MMT and other representatives from around EFC-MAYM met at Northridge Friends for an EFM-led think tank designed to determine where we felt God was leading us as a Yearly Meeting to pursue new missions work as part of EFM's five-year goal of launching new fields and sending new missionaries. After prayer and discussion, the gathering determined our focus would be expansion of work in Central Africa. To that end, we

have begun work on sending Luke 10 exploratory trips to two African nations.

The MMT continues to encourage support for the Friends of Kibimba Hospital board and the work they are doing in Burundi, Africa, to create a top-notch facility able to care for the medical needs of a community with which EFC-MAYM has had a lasting and loving relationship.

CAMP QUAKER HAVEN Spencer Linville, Chairperson

As you all know, 2020 was a trying year for most, but what we learned is trusting the Lord can get us through anything. Camp Quaker Haven ended the year very strong because of the Lords provision. We chose to remain open all year, and let the individual camps decide if they wanted to meet or not. All though many of them cancelled, we were able to fill some of their spots with new, out-of-state groups whose camps were closed for the summer due to government interference. This not only helped offset some of the income loss but also allowed us to build new relationships with new customers that will benefit us in the future. Another big blessing this year was that we saw a lot of our normal groups that did cancel, along with other individuals and churches that are committed to the camps success, send in donations to help.

Because of the unknown of what the year would bring we chose to wrap up the projects we had started, but hold off on anything new.

On behalf of the CQH Board, I want to say thanks to all of you who listened to the Lords leading and played a part, big or small, in making sure CQH will be open to do Kingdom work for many years to come.

STEWARDS BOARD REPORT Jeff Linville, Chairman

The year 2020 was a year we will all remember with the unprecedented events generated by the pandemic. The uncertainty of the future and potential impact to families and churches financial situations was a major concern. But our God is bigger! We ended the year 2020 \$19,661.92 in the black. We thank the Lord for his continual provisions to the local churches and to EFC-MAYM. In our January meeting the Stewards decided to disburse the full surplus back into ministry. The funds were allocated as follows:

Barclay College: \$5,000 Friends University: \$5,000 Home Missions Board: \$9,662

In addition to disbursing the 2020 surplus the Steward also decided to move \$5,000 from the Steward's Reserve into the Health Reimbursement Fund (used for Pastoral medical needs). A recommendation was also sent to the Elder's to

consider salary adjustments in the 3%-5% range for ECF-MAYM Staff members.

We are so grateful for the continued faithfulness of the local churches as you share your blessings.

Each strategy is anchored in providing students with an opportunity to embody our mission, "to prepare students in a Bible-centered environment for effective Christian life, service, and leadership." All of us at Barclay College are in the family to live out this important goal.

Barclay College possesses a unique and remarkable geographical location. Barclay College is becoming known in our region as it is known in the evangelical Friends world. Our employees report attending events in the region and people responding with positive regard when discovering a Barclay College employee is in the room. But our work has just begun in this regard. We have a great challenge in bringing faith-based, higher education to students both in southwest Kansas and around the globe. Our location has often been viewed as a disadvantage but we have been discovering that it is a blessing and we are learning to capitalize on this blessing.

Our relationship with the Friends Church is ongoing. We often ask, "Where would the Friends world be like without Barclay College?" That question helps us better understand why we exist and what we can contribute in the future? Barclay College needs stakeholders from the Friends movement. We are developing expanding educational connections with groups such as Wycliffe Associates and the Our Daily Bread organization worldwide. We want the evangelical Friends movement to stay actively engaged with us.

Academics

I am excited about the recent acceptance of Tim Hawkins to the Doctor of Education program at Johns Hopkins University. Tim has served Barclay College

as Associate VP for Academic Services and then VP for Academic services while chairing our English/Language Arts department. This has been a dream of Tim's for years and for him to achieve this first step toward a life goal is stirring. Congratulations Tim. Dr. Derek Brown will be the new VP for Academic Services and we carry great anticipation for his leadership in visioning our future academic offerings.

We are still on track with our steps toward accreditation for the nursing program. We smashed through the \$800,000 goal to start the nursing program going over \$1 million in cash and pledges. I have enjoyed sharing our dream with donors and organizations. The possibility of a academic program that will produce faith-based nurses moving into positions in western Kansas hospitals has received great affirmation from our supporters and throughout southwest Kansas. Of course our vision for impact far exceeds western Kansas. Our heart is still to produce mission-minded nurses who serve around the globe.

Our new bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice is in the hands of our accreditors and we hope to officially announce that program soon. Other new opportunities for degree programs are in the making. Our Bible/Ministry faculty, from undergraduate through masters still is over 90% Friends professors with high academic credentials. We are convinced that the evangelical Friends voice needs to be heard today as never before.

Athletics

The Barclay College women's basketball team won the Midwest Christian College Conference (MCCC) regular season championship for the first time in our history (nearly 50 years in the conference). We have a banner! The men also won the conference championship... again! It was a fitting conclusion to Coach Scott Post's inaugural season as coach of women's basketball program and the recruiting efforts of the past year. The women and men place second in the conference tournament and the women received an at-large invitation to the national NCCAA tournament where we placed 6th in the nation which was also our final national ranking.

Fine Arts

The theater department presented seven showings of the Disney production, "Newsies!" The productions were masterfully done and each performance seemed to be better than the last. Randi Shetley and her team once again put Barclay College on the map in southwest Kansas and beyond. This followed the fall presentation of Mary Poppins that had been postponed due to COVID. Mary Poppins received equal success and acclaim. It was a busy but rewarding year for our students and the area. We are fulfilling the dreams of the board when it envisioned the impact of the Ross-Ellis Center for Arts and Ministry.

Enrollment

Enrollment for fall 2021 is in process. We are taking a conservative position in projecting our fall enrollment even though our campus new student numbers

are at record highs, nearly double. There is simply not enough historical data at this point to make educated predictions given the appearance of a record enrollment for fall. This is a result of a reorganization of our recruiting department and it appears to be exceeding expectations. We'll see what happens in the fall.

Conclusion

Each Saturday in April we have over 300 children on campus for the area youth soccer league. Nine SW Kansas communities from Haviland to Ashland, KS gathered from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 pm. For youth soccer. The town was packed, the streets were flooded, and there are 4 to 5 games playing every hour on our soccer field. Total, over 1,000 people were on campus each Saturday. It is difficult to find parking or to weave your way down the street by the field. I've often heard the reframe, "I never knew this (Barclay College) was here." These area communities pursued Barclay College to host this league. The area would like more of Barclay College. They want to lean into Barclay College more. There are additional communities that would like to join next year. I'm not sure I can fully imagine the possibilities that exist for Barclay College as we become known in our region as we are known in the Friends Church. As students and families become comfortable with Barclay College and familiar with the campus and the people, BC becomes a real destination for students and their college plans. It is important that we begin to exploit every opportunity to get students and their families to campus from theater, to music, to recreation. Coalition for Hispanic Ministries David C. Byrne – CHM Director

The Coalition for Hispanic Ministries is an organization that is in place for times like this. When the usual structures for ministry are put on their head, there is a need for those who can help bring the pieces together to allow those who are serving in the church to see beyond the regular possibilities. As we have lived through this pandemic, CHM has been active to bring structure and hope to Spanish-speaking churches and their leadership.

During this year, a primary role has been in individual mentorship and coaching as I have interacted with Friends at a distance through the telephone and videoconferencing. The video conferences that we have hosted for years in order to bring people together for classes and meetings across distances have somehow become not only normal but for many, tedious in this year of Zoom, but the need for them continues and can serve an ongoing function of discipleship in the church.

So it is through those electronic means that CHM continues to work with our partner organizations including EFC-MAYM as well as other yearly meetings and organizations, both nationally and internationally, to ensure that the Span-

ish-speaking churches are cared for with the same intensity that the organizational leadership has invested in its English-speaking constituency. In a crisis like the church faced in 2020-21, it is easy to drop all activities that are deemed peripheral in order to focus on the essentials. CHM has been an advocate in "Making Hispanic Ministry the Priority" as the header of our newsletter declares.

This has been the case as we have collaborated with both yearly meeting sessions and national conferences that have been held online since over a year ago. In some ways, the reach of those conferences, including the annual North American Hispanic Friends Conference sponsored by the North American ministerial alliance of Hispanic Friends, have seen a broader audience than has been possible in the past now that the conferences and their sessions can be more broadly accessible without the requirements of travel.

As the need for pandemic restrictions diminish, which we hope will be the case in the coming months, our expectation is to have many more personal contacts and classes with Spanish-speaking churches and their leadership. There seems to be an increasing hunger for the assuring touch of personal ministry, especially among the leaders who have been in the center of life and death decision making under the relentless pressure of disease and politics.

I look forward in this coming season to many more personal contacts and to setting up the conferences and classes that will help the Hispanic churches and also help others like those in EFC-MAYM who are called to reach out to the diverse Hispanic communities around them.

Along the way I expect to see the Lord work though His church in many different ways by means of the infrastructure that CHM and those growing churches provide. For instance, I am excited about the possibility of working in coordination with Central American Friends to help establish some form of retirement resources – possibly a retirement home or some type of pension program – that will care for the needs of the many retired Friends pastors who don't have the means to live on their own after long self-sacrificing careers in ministry. Such a project may not be as central to the mission of CHM as church planting or leadership training, but it is an obvious need that CHM is uniquely positioned to address.

As we saw last year and as we can read in the Psalms: "The Lord knows all human plans; he knows that they are futile." (Ps. 94:11)

It is difficult to foresee what comes next, but I thank God for the fact that we can trust Him in every detail and that as we yield ourselves wholeheartedly to Him, He will direct our paths. In this sense, CHM stands with EFC-MAYM to be used of God as an instrument of God's grace to the world and of His mission for us to the world.

Introduction

This past year has been unlike any other school year Friends University has witnessed as we lived amidst a world-wide pandemic. We set audacious goals one being to begin the school year with in-person classes with online alternatives, along with establishing necessary safety precautions needed to minimize the risk to our campus community. As we pressed forward in faith, His mercies were visible every morning. In-person classes were available for the entire academic year while keeping COVID cases to a minimal level. We celebrate the hard work and achievements that led the university to see a record number of students who enrolled at Friends University. We saw an increase in the generosity of our donors. And most importantly, we have grown in communion with God. It is often in times of challenge that we experience the most growth. In this report, you will read about how the Friends University community has thrived over the last year. Students have received a transformative educational experience with opportunities to take part in nationally recognized programs and be led by top-notch professors who value each student individually.

Faith-based initiatives

The weekly Things Above podcast has continued to increase in engagement and reach new audiences over the course of the last year. The podcast has over 600,000 downloads which is an increase of 250,000 downloads from the previous year. Host Dr. James Bryan Smith continues to illustrate spiritual thoughts through Godly devotions and numerous distinguished guests who are devoted to sharing and setting their minds on things above. The success of the podcast is in part because it stays true to the message that what we put in our minds is critical to our Christian spiritual formation. Each episode is recorded on the Friends University campus and has a world-wide dedicated audience tuning in. The podcast can be found at <u>apprenticeinstitute.org/things-above-podcast</u>. The Apprentice Institute has been preparing for the 10th annual national conference, The Apprentice Gathering, which will take place on the Friends University campus Sept. 23-25, 2021. The event will bring nearly twenty distinguished guests and speakers and attendees from around the country to focus on spiritual formation and to deeply understand what it means to be a follower of Jesus. The Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) led several groups of coaches through 3D Coaching which is a program that guides and trains coaches on how to coach all three dimensions of coaching- the skills and strategies of the game, the mind and the transformation of the heart. FCA staff member Keith Townsend goes through this program with each new head coach at Friends University. Campus Ministries continued to lead engaging livestreamed and in -person worship services throughout the year. The pastoral team, guest speakers and praise team filled our souls and gave us a renewing strength each week. This year we also celebrated our fourth annual Quaker Heritage Week. Faculty, students, staff and alumni shared testimonial videos illustrating how the Friends University RISE values align with the Quaker SPICES.

Academics

Friends University launched several new degree programs and a new certification this year to allow students to further focus their degree program into specialized career paths. In addition, several of our programs have been recognized for their academic excellence and quality.

Friends University is pleased to offer a new Bachelor of Business Administration in Strategic Leadership and a Master of Science in Strategic Leadership along with a new Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice for non-traditional students in the College of Graduate and Professional Studies. These new degree programs will meet market demand and help Friends graduates gain a competitive edge in their careers.

Along with the new degrees, the Friends University Cyber Security degree program has added a new component for each student as it also includes the CompTIA Security+ certificate.

Friends University is now a Bloomberg Terminal school allowing students to have the opportunity to experience the same platform used by the world's leading banks, corporations and government agencies to view real-time global financial data, news feeds and messages. Friends is one of approximately 300 colleges and universities around the globe and the first in Wichita to integrate Bloomberg into the curricula of the business and finance degree programs. Friends University has been awarded top ranking status for multiple degree programs and was listed among hundreds of competing institutions across the nation by Intelligent.com. Each ranking is based on curriculum quality, graduation rate, reputation and post-graduate employment. Friends was recognized in the Best Colleges in Kansas for 2021 category, Best Master's in Marriage and Family Therapy degree program, Best Online Master's in Accounting, Best Online Master's in Healthcare Administration and Best Online MBA Programs. It is an honor to have earned national rankings from U.S. News & World Reports. The 2021 national rankings for Friends University include Top Regional University- Midwest and Top Performers on Social Mobility – Regional Universities. The Best Online Programs high ranking include the Online Bachelor's Programs (business administration, accounting and elementary education) and master's degrees for the Master of Health Care Leadership, Master of Management Information Systems, Master of Business Administration and the Global Master of Business Administration along with the Master of Education in Teaching and Learning.

Friends has also received national recognition once again as a College of Distinction for the integrity of its truly individualized and engaging education. The University is recognized as a College of Distinction, Christian College of Distinction and a Kansas College of Distinction. In addition, Friends has received national recognition from the Homeschooling Parent Association (HSPA) and a designation as a Military Friendly School.

The Friends University Early College Academy (ECA) is expanding its partnership with Wichita Public Schools - USD 259, to include tuition discounts and a \$13,000 scholarship for students who wish to continue their college edu-

cation at Friends University upon high school graduation. The Early College Academy program allows high school students to take college classes for dual credit and is designed to promote access and opportunity for more students to graduate with a college degree.

Student Scholarships

Friends University once again offered students from Wichita and surrounding school districts the opportunity to earn a STEM Promise scholarship. Three winners were selected from a pool of applications. They had to meet a minimum of a 3.2 GPA, be admitted to a Friends University STEM program, demonstrate a financial need, and submit two essays on why they want to pursue a career in a STEM field and how they will contribute to the Friends University community. The Inclusion Fellowship was awarded to an area teacher who is pursuing a Master of Education in Teaching and Learning, and has demonstrated an inclusive approach for each student while explaining teaching behaviors to illustrate how all students can learn.

Student Activities

Student activities looked a little different this year and organizers were creative in order to give students the opportunity to participate. SGA students attended a two-day retreat prior to the spring semester start on campus, RISE Week was featured on Instagram for all to see and the notorious Walkout tradition was granted by President Dr. Carey which gave students a day off from classes to celebrate athletic championships. The Office of Multicultural Engagement hosted a number of events to support our commitment to an inclusive environment. Several highlights included Dessert and Dialogue! The Multicultural Experience; Table Talk panel discussion about inclusion and student advocacy; ICT Virtual Youth Led Candidate Town Hall meeting with collaboration from other local universities; Anti-Racist Raja Yoga; Black Artist Series: Exploring Black History Through Art and Music; Lunar New Year celebrations; and a conversation on Faith, Race and Sports with Cameron Friend

Fine Arts

Despite the pandemic and all the challenges it presented, the Fine Arts Division at Friends thrived as they found innovative ways of exploring the arts and stretching ourselves in new ways. All of the performing groups presented concerts, shows and productions, whether they were outdoors, socially distanced indoors, or streamed virtually. Students, faculty and staff rose to the occasion to offer high-quality educational opportunities as well as inspiring arts events for the community to enjoy.

Some highlights were the Handel opera at the zoo, (with giraffes enjoying the music along with the human audience!); the musical Working choreographed by our new music theatre professor Sheldon Mba; the visual art collaboration with Chinatown in New York City; the orchestra concert featuring student soloists; the Singing Quakers Home concert including a world premiere; and the Jazz collaboration with the Kansas African American Museum. Collaboration both on and off campus continued throughout the pandemic and will remain an important feature of our programs.

Fine Arts also hosted many fine senior music recitals and the senior art show this year. Students received regional awards in music and visual art. Many graduates are starting new jobs including music education graduates who once again have a 100 percent job placement rate, or other graduates pursuing further education in graduate school. Hearing award-winning senior Sam Scantlin sing the National Anthem at the Kansas City Royals baseball game on May 3 was a treat for everyone.

Athletics

In a year unlike any other, the Friends University administration, staff, coaches and student-athletes pulled together to successfully complete the 2020-21 season. A trio of National Champions highlighted the Friends University Falcon athletics season, with Aubry Donley (2:13.69) winning the 800 meters NAIA Indoor Track & Field national championship and Aileen Gurrola (1:33.21) taking home the top prize in the 600 meters at the same meet. Dulce Delacruz captured the Falcons' first-ever Powerlifting national title to help the team to a fifth-place overall finish at the USA Collegiate Nationals in Baton Rouge, La. The Falcons placed right behind Midland University, Ohio State University, UW-Madison and the University of Houston in the national team standings. The Falcons won both the KCAC Women's and Men's Indoor Track & Field Championships, with the Falcon men finishing as the conference runner-up at the Outdoor meet. The Men's and Women's cross country teams also gave the Falcons a pair of second-place showings at the KCAC meet.

In the classroom, the Women's Indoor Track & Field Falcons paced the field with a conference-leading 16 KCAC Scholar Athletes, while the Men's Indoor Track & Field squad tied for the league lead with 11 scholar athlete honorees. 17 Falcon athletic teams earned the NAIA Scholar Team award and the University was named an NAIA Champions of Character Five-Star Gold Institution. The Football Falcons also placed five student-athletes on the National Football Foundation Hampshire Honor Society list.

This season also set in motion new beginnings, with the addition of the Men's and Women's Wrestling programs for next year, along with bringing the Men's Golf program back to campus for the first time since 2015. Additionally, a pair of new multi-media shows made their debut in 2020. *Talking with Friends* is an athletics podcast that is available on YouTube, Apple ITunes and Spotify, while the *Coaches Corner* features frequent sit-down interviews with Falcon coaches.

The Falcon Athletic Department branched out beyond the usual campus home events and partnered with the KCAC to host the NAIA Opening Round Regional while also serving as the host for the NJCAA Region VI Tournament. To use the cliché "The Best is Yet to Come," this year will be capped with a major renovation in the Garvey Center, which is expected to be completed for the start of the 2021-22 athletics season. The renovation will include a new weight room, training room, administrative offices and main entry lobby.

FRIENDS WOMEN FELLOWSHIP Desiree Crisp, President

Our programs and devotional themes for FWF Groups for 2020 was "The Seasons of Our Lives" emphasizing God's truth, goodness, loving kindness, love, His steadfastness and unchanging faithfulness. To say it was a very timely message for a very unprecedented "season" where we needed to be reminded of all of these promises is an understatement, indeed!

FWF groups did not meet in person for several months in 2020, some nearly a year. Learning to be faithful out of the box of Church buildings was a challenge that was difficult but not defeating! Our project list included a car (N. India) and motorcycles (Nepal & Bangladesh), Bangladesh women's ministry, Burundi VBS, Nepal water filters, Rwanda Friends Theological College, Kibimba Hospital, computers for Bangladesh, Children's Project - car (Ireland) & bicycles (Nepal). Our goal for this 2020 project list was \$22,320. We fell short of the goal by only \$174.66 leaving our total giving towards our goals at \$22,145.34!

Our list of officers can be found here as well as our Reading Course, Constitution and Bylaws, Yearbook, Program Book and Quaker Bonnet newsletter.

Our quarterly newsletter, Quaker Bonnet, is an essential form of communication and education to our FWF groups, churches and missionaries. It includes various activities groups are doing to promote missions, foreign and local, updates from workers, inspiration, challenge, FWF annual retreat info and Ministry Conference Prayer Breakfast. We offer a paper subscription for \$5 or an email subscription for no cost. A total of 277 subscriptions are mailed or emailed every quarter. Laura Davenport is our dedicated editor and would welcome pictures and info from your group/area related to our ministry goals and projects.

For many years, FWF has maintained a yearly recommended Reading Course which includes book choices in various subjects including Missions, Christian Life/Biography, Friends (Quaker)/Christian Classics and Christian Fiction. These books are always listed on our website. Groups enjoy sharing books and some utilize this list for book clubs.

A highlight of every year is our annual Women's Retreat. North Central area was our planning committee for the 2020 retreat and overcame incredible obstacles because of Covid19 by hosting a virtual retreat that was well attended by approximately 125 women. Our women were encouraged and inspired by our speaker Jan Johnson and our worship leader Carrie Beyer and family. We are looking forward to gathering for the 2021 Women's Retreat in Broken Arrow, OK at Stoney Creek, October 8-10 to "Revive & Renew" with speaker DeAnna De La Bretonne, hosted by Tri-State area.

Coming out of the hard season of 2020 brings us to a new "Perspective," our program theme for 2021. Our program book for this year is compiled and edited by Julie Kinser.

KALEO ACADEMY Brockie Follette, Director

The challenges of this past year and a half forced our *Kaleo Academy* staff to add and develop some new aims. As the reality of our pandemic world set in, after much prayer and discernment, we made a shift in our activities. We decided to not have a 2020-21 cohort of students and mentors go through *Kaleo Academy* and instead focused on our KA alumni and the larger evangelical Friends Church. While making this shift we developed a new *Kaleo Academy Advisory Board* and we hired Mark DeVries at *Ministry Architects* to consult with our staff for 6 months.

An important action we took in the Summer of 2021, was to hire Sarah Wing, a Kaleo alumna, to be our *KA Summer Intern*. Her primary role was to creatively help our staff stay connected with our alumni throughout the summer and fall. The activities with our *Kaleo Academy* alumni consisted of alumni-led zoom prayer and worship gatherings, monthly personal check-in phone calls or texts from *Kaleo Academy* staff to each of our alumni, an alumni summer music playlist on Spotify and YouTube, care packages to college-aged alumni during the fall semester, and personal Christmas Cards to each alumni and their mentor. Lastly, a discussion commenced about developing a *Kaleo 2.0* Ministry Internship program designed to place our alumni into ministry internships among evangelical Friends churches around the country. We are piloting *Kaleo 2.0* this summer with a KA alumni at Northridge Friends Church, and Riverside Friends in Iowa Yearly Meeting. We are also looking for churches to partner with in the summer of 2022. If your church is interested, please send an email to brockie follette@barclaycollege.edu to learn more.

In the Summer of 2021, our KA staff quickly provided encouragement to our Friends denomination during the unusual times. Our KA Alumni contributed encouragement through a "Words to the Friends Church" resource, we dramatically increased our social media presence offering different resources on different days of the week, often using the voices of our alumni. With suggestions from our alumni and other leaders we developed Kaleo Conversations. Kaleo Conversations were topical discussions with young and old leaders from the evangelical Friends Church hosted on Facebook around these topics:

Creative Summer Children's Ministry & VBS Camp; What will It Look Like this Summer? Intergenerational Ministry; Our New Reality Walking Through Racial Injustice Together Alternatives to Summer Mission Trips Growing Young Workshop Racial Injustice Alumni Conversation Responding in a Christ-like Way to Conflict Soul Care in these Unusual Times Navigating Life's Transitions Well Discipleship in the Midst of Life

We also brought back some former KA Theology Camp teachers for *Kaleo Classes*, mini classes featuring former or potential Kaleo Academy teachers.

- -Quaker Faith and practices sessions 1-3 (taught by Chuck Orwiler)
- -What is Soul Care? (taught by Craig Davis)
- -Quakers and Social Issues sessions 1-3 (taught by Nathan Martin)

In addition, our KA Alumni helped us create the **Kaleo** *Community*, which was student-Led Zoom worship and prayer for *Kaleo Academy* alumni and others.

Through the course of the year, we continued to hear from our Kaleo Alumni of a concern over not being able to go on mission trips and other youth conferences during the pandemic. As a result we partnered with *Evangelical Friends Mission* and coordinated an intergenerational *Virtual Mission Trip* to close the year out.

Here is a quote from a VMT participant:

"Since it is highly unlikely that I would ever be able to travel overseas to a mission field, I really appreciated the opportunity to do so virtually. We still had a personal connection with our missionaries and each other. As mission trips are not easily done, more virtual mission trips are needed in order to encourage missionaries on field."

The blessing of COVID for our leadership was that we found time to focus on aspects of *Kaleo Academy* that sometimes get moved to the back burner. Our team made progress in areas such as working on a yearly calendar for fundraising, looking towards building an advisory board, giving a stronger presence to our Friends denomination, and communication with alumni.

In 2021, we begin once again to recruit for our KA 2021-22 KA cohort. We also begin to turn our stronger efforts towards fundraising. Our need for the year 2021 is \$7,870 and we have already exceeded that number! Now, we are beginning to look towards 2022 and our need is \$8,800. KICKAPOO FRIENDS CENTER

"NOW TO HIM WHO IS ABLE TO DO EXCEEDINGLY ABUNDANT-LY ABOVE ALL THAT WE ASK OR THINK, ACCORDING TO THE POWER THAT WORKS IN US, TO HIM BE GLORY IN THE CHURCH BY CHRIST JESUS TO ALL GENERATIONS, FOREVER AND EVER. AMEN." Ephesians 3:20,21 NKJV

It would be very easy to focus on the negative aspects of the last year. Most of us have experienced difficulties we would classify as "unprecedented" in our lifetimes. But let us focus on what God is doing in the midst of a world in turmoil.

Certainly we pray that God will break through to our Kickapoo and other native tribes in the area and that many in mass will come to Him, and we ask you to join us in this prayer. But currently victories are won on a one by one basis.

There is the opportunity that comes from a covid death of a Kickapoo person that brought over 150 people who would not normally attend any kind of worship service at a church, who heard the gospel and three people who asked me to pray with them afterward. Or just a few weeks later another death of covid brought a similar amount of traditional Kickapoo who also intently listened to the gospel. These were the parents and grandparents of some of the youth we work with, which has opened a door for more of them to attend regularly.

Or just as we are also part of the broader McLoud community, we held the funeral of a lifelong neighbor and farmer. This man was not a Christian most of his life but his daughter had led him in a prayer of faith before he became too ill and in the years before that Kathy Burris had led both her mother and sister to Christ on their deathbeds. Everyone needs a daughter like Kathy who prayed and didn't give up until the battle was won. I would have never believed God would have used Jr. Loman to give me an oppor-

tunity to preach the Gospel of Christ to so many of the older and founding families of McLoud. Often at a funeral, people pay their respects but tune out the message, but it was obvious that people that day listened intently.

As our Wednesday youth gatherings have been very small and inconsistent this last year, it has been challenging to teach. But we have been able to share and build into our youth some foundational beliefs like: Who is God? Why did Jesus come? What is sin? Why is the Bible important? Why is your life important? All this has been actually a way to teach systematic theology to youth and teens. And with all this there has been the opportunity to lead nearly a dozen Kickapoo youth to pray to receive Christ into their lives.

There is Isabel, an eight year old Kickapoo Girl, who is excited about coming to church and praying. When we ask for prayer requests, her hand is the first one up. She has a long prayer list which mostly includes praying for family to stop drinking and using drugs. Recently, she shared how God had answered one of her prayers for her father. Isabel is coming to church because her grandfather, Tommy Kaskaske, who has been sober now for several years and trying to serve the Lord, brings her. Although Tommy has had many struggles, his decision to follow Christ has begun to have a big impact in his family, now over this last year, his older daughter has begun to attend regularly and you can see faith growing in her.

Of course there have been negatives, we lost two of our long time families, who chose to worship elsewhere but that has challenged some of our others to step up and serve. To see the growth in them is exciting.

Our Easter service in 2021 was the best we have had in years. Traditionally, we host a breakfast on Easter Sunday. I asked everyone if they wanted to do that but I was not going to

make it happen. They said we want to have it. We ended up having more people for breakfast and church than we have had for years, Praise God!

We also were affected by Covid 19, Saturday, January 9th, Christine developed a high fever. After a visit to the emergency room on Sunday, it was determined that she was positive. They sent her home but she continued to worsen. By Tuesday, we were back at the hospital where they admitted her with pneumonia. With medical help, she stabilized at the hospital and slowly began to recover. Her progress has been very slow but steady and now she seems to be near complete recovery. We are very thankful for everyone's prayers and support during this time. Thankfully, I did not get the virus and tested negative.

As we look forward to the rest of the year, it seems unlikely that we will have Quivering Arrow Camp this year because of the youth group situations at both Wyandotte and Kickapoo. We do however, look forward to Vacation Bible School June 7 - 11. Hopefully as things continue to normalize we will be able to again start our work training classes and host other events to touch people, help them in their daily lives and of course share the Gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

We were saddened in February of the loss of one of our dear friends and long time supporters of the ministry, Steve Smith. Steve as his father Horace before him, was an enthusiastic supporter of Friends Indian work. He will be greatly missed. Through our sadness though, we have been blessed by his family suggesting us for memorial donations. Steve touched many people and over eighty have made donations in his name. Thank you! We ask you to pray that God will raise up Christian leaders among our Kickapoo believers. Leaders who will boldly live and proclaim the Gospel of Christ. We ask that you also pray that the congregation of the Kickapoo Friends Center can become a strong and faithful church that even sends out missionaries to other places.

Certainly, our Lord can do exceedingly more than we could ever ask or think to Him be all the glory!

Friends of Kibimba Hospital Report Dick Long

Dr. Elisee Nahimana and the staff of Kibimba Hospital continue to provide excellent medical care in central Africa. Our most recent information is that while Dr. Elisee himself had COVID-19 in May and recovered, there have been no cases at the hospital. We praise God for His protection.

Since Friends of Kibimba Hospital (FKH) reported to EFC-MAYM, much has been accomplished at Kibimba Hospital. In July, 2019, construction on a new 2 -story, 300-bed maternity and pediatric building was started. With supplies from the Burundi government such as rebar and concrete, work has progressed steadily and supplies are beginning to be gathered to furnish the building. This includes blankets, sheets, gowns and the workers to make them. In March, 2021, FKH was able to send \$5,000 to purchase the first batch of sheets. Friends women will be sending \$1,500 towards this project.

In November, 2019, funds were sent to cover the cost of purchasing new morgue equipment and a building has been constructed to house that. However, due to COVID shipment has been delayed for some time. Please pray that this vital equipment is released and delivered soon. Also, in November, 2019 funds were sent to enable the purchase of new lab equipment that is in place and much appreciated.

The hospital has received some physical therapy equipment from Belgium, and now has a physical therapy facility on-site that has been getting good use. There is a treadmill, stationary bike, assisted standing unit and many other necessary items for those who need assistance after strokes and other injuries and illnesses.

Two other projects that have been underway include remodeling the doctor's former residence into a 10-bedroom guest house and building a security wall

for that residence. A new water well was also drilled, and water was found just below the old artesian well. What a blessing!

The Friends of Kibimba Hospital board continues to support and encourage Dr. Elisee and his staff as they seek to bring healing and Jesus' love to their patients. Our board has mourned the loss of one of our founding members, Willard Ferguson, in January, 2021. Please pray for our Chairperson Mae Kellum and her husband David as they face health issues.

Some statistics for the year of 2020 at the hospital: total patients 15,300, total deliveries 1876, total surgeries 1946, total vaccinated 7316, X-ray 1065. You can support FKH as we continue to provide part of Dr. Elisee's salary, as well as funds for special projects throughout the year. As I write this annual report for Evangelical Friends Church International (EFCI), the global umbrella for our extended family of Evangelical Friends from all around the world, I am preparing to depart for a 10-day pilgrimage to the Mediterranean world to retrace the footsteps of the Apostles, men and women who took the call to fulfill Jesus' Great Commission very, very seriously. So much so, in fact, that by the end of the first century the gospel had already penetrated three continents (Asia, Africa and Europe), i.e., every portion of the world that was known to them at that time!

Nearly 2,000 years later, the Lord is continuing to raise up a new generation of Spirit-filled men and women who are just as deeply committed to fulfilling the Great Commission in the spirit of the Great Commandment as those very first friends of Jesus. In fact, EFCI is partnering with Evangelical Friends Mission (EFM), the mission-sending agency for our North American region, to prayerfully identify 10 new missionary households who might be willing to say, "here I am; send me," in order to establish 5 new mission fields among unreached people and unreached people groups during the next 5 years.

One of the greatest blessings I have experienced during my brief time as interim director for EFCI is to watch the Lord of the harvest plant the seeds of new missional initiatives among our wider family of Friends in Africa, Asia, Europe and Latin America. Over the course of the past year alone ...

- Over 200 representatives from 25 countries outside of the U.S. participated in the International Friends Church Multiplication Conference in November via Zoom and YouTube!
- EFCI-Africa appointed their very first regional mission coordinator as a first step in the process of establishing their own regional mission-sending agency, aka, "EFM-Africa"!
- EFCI-Asia has identified at least 30 young Friends who are ready and willing to take the gospel to unreached people in their region and is praying specifically about a new ministry to Australia!
- EFCI-Europe is poised to commission a new missionary family to establish a new mission field among the least-reached people in their region!
- EFCI-Latin America is continuing build strategic missional partnerships that will allow them to expand their regional outreach and launch new work beyond their own borders!

Needless to say, these are exciting days that are pregnant with possibilities when it comes to the ministry of the gospel among Evangelical Friends. May we continue to remain steadfast in our efforts to pray that the Lord of the harvest will send out workers into his harvest field in the days ahead as we remain ever mindful that "the harvest is [still] plentiful, but the workers are [still too] few" (Luke 10:2).

- Host a National Evangelical Friends Pastor's Conference in conjunction with Summit 2023. The Coordinating Council requests that each yearly meeting forego their annual pastor's conference in 2023 and participate in the national event.


EFM Summer 2021 Update

Eleven Areas for Exploration through Luke 10 Trips

On Thursday, May 27th, about sixty Friends gathered at Quaker Ridge, Colorado, for the national EFM Luke 10 Think Tank. Among these Friends were future missionaries, church leaders, and people with missions experience. They represented six regions/yearly meetings of North America. Their primary task was to discern where the Lord of the harvest wants us to explore for the launching of at least five new fields by the end of 2025. Eleven areas were selected on that day and assigned to the regions/yearly meetings that will organize EFM Luke 10 Trips to explore them over the next couple of years. The colors and legend on the map above show where those areas are.



Why are we doing this exploration?

EFM's Five-Year Goal is to send

10 MISSIONARY HOUSEHOLDS
to launch 5 NEW MISSION FIELDS
in the next 5 YEARS.

Who is Evangelical Friends Mission and what do we do?

Prayer is not just making our requests known to God, it is also giving him thanks and praise for what he is doing. We invite you to practice both by praying through the following:

Praises

- For the Future Missionary Retreat that was held at Quaker Ridge, Colorado, May 24-27. Fifteen potential missionaries participated in the retreat along with fifteen missionary mentors. Five regions/yearly meetings were represented in both groups.
- For the list EFM has of people who are exploring whether the Lord wants them to be among the workers he is casting out into the harvest field. Currently there are more than 70 people on that list.
- For the national EFM Luke 10 Think Tank that met at Quaker Ridge on May 27. Nearly 60 people from six regions/yearly meetings felt led to explore 11 places in the world for the launching of at least five new fields by 2025. The exploration will take place through EFM Luke 10 Trips over the next couple of years.
- That the Lord has protected the health of the missionaries and national leaders as they do their best to support those they work with during this worldwide health and economic crisis. More people have given their lives to Christ and more churches have been planted during the pandemic.
- For the generous donations made to our emergency fund for helping meet some of the needs created by the spread of COVID-19. Twelve fields benefited from these gifts.
- For the progress made towards the goal of planting 108 cell groups in Bhutan. They are getting close! This is already one of the largest Christian movements within that country.

Prayer Requests

- That the Lord of the harvest would raise up at least ten new missionaries (households) from our regions/yearly meetings in North America and cast them out into at least five new fields by December 31, 2025.
- For the 70+ people who are in a process of discernment about whether the Lord of the harvest wants them to be among those who help start these new fields. More Future Missionary Retreats and also Future Missionary Short-Term Trips are being planned to help them discern the Lord's will.
- For the regions/yearly meetings as they organize EFM Luke 10 Trips to explore eleven places in the world for launching new fields. These trips will include future missionaries, church leaders, people with missions experience, and Friends from other countries who live near the areas being explored.
- That the Lord in his mercy will relieve the suffering caused by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Many people have lost loved ones and are struggling with the economic impact of the pandemic.
- That the situation caused by the spread of COVID-19 would create a spiritual hunger all around the world that would help people be more receptive to Jesus' invitation to take his yoke and follow him.
- For the wisdom and strength missionaries and national leaders need to guide their ministries through the coming months.
- That our local churches, regions/yearly meetings, and EFM will see the provision of the Lord in the midst of economic difficulties worldwide.
- For missionaries who are planning to return to the U.S. this year for deputation (like Kathi Perry in Ireland and the Ben and Charity Kibbe family in Thailand) and others who are hoping to begin or continue the ministries the Lord has called them to (like Molly Morton who has been preparing to minister in Ireland and the Carpenter family who is returning to Rwanda). Voicu and Ana Marian and Roy and Jinky Twaddell will also be in the U.S. to celebrate their retirement with their supporters.
- For the search for a new Executive Director for EFM. Until that person is appointed, Dan Cammack remains the Executive Director and Matt Macy the Associate Director. When the new E.D. is ready to start work, Dan will become the Field Director (focused on missionaries, fields, international partnerships, coaches, field support teams, etc.) and Matt will become the Director of Mobilization (focused on the various pieces of the Luke 10 Initiative, recruiting of new missionaries, internships, etc.). Please pray for these transitions

EFM has been blessed over the years by regular giving from the yearly meetings/ regions, local churches, and a host of individuals. Such giving has enabled us to support the ministry of EFM's missionaries as well as respond to emergencies and special projects on the fields. We are grateful for this faithful giving. At the same time, EFM has underfunded ministries that need supported both in the office and overseas, and, in light of the current economic situation of the world, we, like you, are looking to our heavenly Father to provide for our needs. Since he often provides through the body of Christ we will continue to keep you informed of our needs and invite you to respond as the Lord leads.

- Much of the growth that EFM has experienced over the years has been in Asia, right in the middle of a multitude of unreached people groups. One might think that these exciting ministries are the easiest ones to fund, but that is not always true. Contact our office (303-421-8100) for the most recent information on underfunded fields in Asia to support.
- Several years ago, EFM formed a partnership with Mexico Yearly Meeting (MYM) to help them send out their first missionaries, Jaime and Lupita Leon. Jaime and Lupita are from Aguascalientes, Mexico, and are currently serving in the state of Sinaloa in northwest Mexico. Churches and individuals in MYM made a commitment to cover the Leon's salary. EFM offered to cover their ministry expenses as well as ongoing training for missionary service. We could use your help with those expenses. You can contribute by giving online at https://catalog.friendsmission.com/projects. MYM is getting ready to send more missionaries like the Leons, and EFM would like to support them in a similar way.
- For many years EFM has been partnering with yearly meetings in Rwanda, Burundi, and the Congo to train leaders. We see much fruit from these training efforts, but as these yearly meetings continue to grow the need for more leaders also grows. Income for EFM's yearly contributions to the training has been dropping off in recent years, so we invite you to help us turn that trend around. You can do so by sending gifts for the Great Lakes Leadership Training initiatives.
- Whenever our missionaries come to the U.S. for deputation they always need to raise funds for their own support and sometimes for special projects as well. A really good way to encourage the missionaries is by responding to their requests for both prayer and financial support. In the next few months you will have the opportunity to do that for Molly Morton (Ireland), Kathi Perry (Ireland), and the Kibbe family (Thailand). Are you sensing that God might be leading you to become a missionary? Or are you aware of someone that has that leading and who would be OK with us getting in touch with him or her? Would you like to be part of helping to explore the eleven areas that were selected by the national EFM Luke 10 Think Tank? This exploration will be done through what we call EFM Luke 10 Trips. We believe that through this process of discernment the Lord will show us where EFM will launch at least five new fields by 2025.

In order for the Luke 10 Trips to be effective we need four kinds of people to be part of them: People who are exploring a call to missionary service (we like to call them "future missionaries"), church leaders from the regions/yearly meetings of North America, people with missions experience, and church leaders from yearly meetings that are close to the areas we will be exploring. If you fit in one of those categories and want to be part of a trip or two, please let us know by filling out our Luke 10 Initiative Form at friendsmission.com/five-year goal-go/.


Below are the eleven areas of the world that were selected by the national Luke 10 Think Tank and where Luke 10 Trips will take place over the next couple of years. We've also indicated the regions/yearly meetings that are taking the lead in organizing these trips.

- **1.The Shuar people of Ecuador and Peru.** Steps have already been taken by EFM over the last several years to launch a field among the underreached tribe called the Shuar who live in the jungle of southeast Ecuador and northeast Peru. Much more help is needed to actually launch that field. Northwest Yearly Meeting (NWYM) is taking the lead on organizing exploratory trips to that area. Evangelical Friends Church-Eastern Region (EFC-ER) has also expressed interest in this opportunity.
- **2. Northeast Brazil.** There is a small group of Friends churches in northeast Brazil that border an immense area where there are very few evangelical churches of any kind. This could be a whole new field. Rocky Mountain Yearly Meeting (RMYM) is taking the lead on organizing exploratory trips to that area. There may also be some interest from EFC-ER in this opportunity.
- **3. Mexico.** Mexico Yearly Meeting (MYM) has a vision to plant Friends churches in every state of Mexico and has already taken steps in that direction. There are 32 states in that country, most of which have no Friends churches. Evangelical Friends Church-Mid America (EFC-MAYM) is feeling led to help explore through Luke 10 Trips the possibility of partnering with MYM to establish a new field in one of

- **4. Eastern Europe.** Tony and Agi Frei, who are based in Hungary, and Voicu and Ana Marian, who are based in Romania, have been encouraging EFM to send missionaries to Europe. NWYM is interested in doing just that and is taking the lead on organizing Luke 10 Trips to Eastern Europe especially. EFC-ER also has interest in this region.
- **5. Greece.** There are young adults from both NWYM and EFC-MAYM who have spent time among Muslim refugees in Greece. They are feeling drawn to planting churches not only among the refugees but also among the Greeks themselves. NWYM is taking the lead to explore these possibilities through Luke 10 Trips.
- **6. South Sudan/Ethiopia.** There has been quite a bit of interest in planting churches in this part of Africa. Evangelical Friends Church-Rwanda is already taking steps in that direction. EFC MAYM is taking the lead to organize some Luke 10 Trips that will help explore the next steps in launching that field.
- **7. Tanzania.** There has also been quite a bit of interest in planting more churches in Tanzania, especially on the part of Friends in Burundi. They are already supporting some work in western Tanzania. EFC-MAYM is taking the lead to organize Luke 10 Trips to that country in order to explore other opportunities. EFC-ER and Indiana Yearly Meeting have also expressed interest in this opportunity.
- **8. Morocco.** All of the regional Luke 10 Think Tanks listed Morocco as a place of interest, and that conversation continued at the national Luke 10 Think Tank. NWYM will take the lead in organizing Luke 10 Trips to that country since it has placed missionaries there in the past.
- **9. Gulf Countries.** There is a large population of Nepali people who go to the Gulf Countries of the Middle East for work. There are also many Bhutanese/Nepali people who have come to the United States as refugees. Many of them have found Christ, some even before reaching the U.S. They have a vision for planting churches among the Nepali workers in the Gulf Countries. EFC-ER is taking the lead to organize Luke 10 Trips that will explore that possibility.
- 10. Northern India. India is another place that wound up on the lists of all the regional Luke 10 Think Tanks as a place of interest. Nearly all the regions/ yearly meetings are helping to support various ministries in that country. Right now the focus is more on the northern part of India. What more would the Lord have us do to reach the unreached in those places? Indiana Yearly Meeting is giving some leadership to the conversation about who will organize Luke 10 Trips to go explore the answer to that question. EFC-MAYM has expressed strong interest in this opportunity.
- **11. The Lahu People of Thailand, Laos, etc.** It appears that the Lahu people group forms a hub that can give access to several countries, Thailand, Laos, and China among them. EFC-ER is taking the lead on organizing Luke 10 Trips to explore this opportunity further.



The Children's Mission Focus gives our children and young people ways to Pray, Give, and Go. It's a curriculum that is based on stories about Friends missionaries who pioneered new fields. The first one came out last year and told the story of Esther Butler. She was sent to China in 1887 by Ohio Yearly Meeting (now called Evangelical Friends Church-Eastern Region). The second one that has just been released tells the story of William Abel who came out of California Yearly Meeting (now called Friends Southwest). He went to Bolivia in 1919 and became the seed for a large group of Friends churches that exists in that country today. We encourage you to put these materials to use.
